### News happens everywhere

**The Battle of Stone Corral (Jun 1893):** After months of searching for fugitive robbers John Sontag and Christopher Evans, also known as the Sontag-Evans Gang, authorities caught up with them in June 1893 in what is now known as the Battle of Stone Corral, or the Gunfight at Stone Corral, near Visalia, California.



**Miami Hurricane (Sep 1926):** The 1926 Miami hurricane was a large and intense tropical cyclone equivalent in strength to a Category 4 hurricane. The storm resulted in \$100 million in damage and was the beginning of the decline of the 1920s Florida land boom as it drove many developers into bankruptcy.




Amelia Earhart (Nov 1935): Amelia Earhart joined the Purdue University faculty in 1935. In 1937, the Purdue Research Foundation provided funding for her round-the-world flight.



**On bus boycotts/racial bus segregation** (1955): The Montgomery bus boycott was a political protest against racial segregation on public transit in Montgomery, Alabama. The boycott began December 5, 1955, after Rosa Parks had been arrested for refusing to give up her seat to a white passenger.



September 11th, 2001 Terrorist Attack (Sep 12, 2001): On September 11th, 2001, the militant group al-Qaeda attacked the twin towers of the World Trade Center after having hijacked commercial airplanes. The attack resulted in 2,977 fatalities, over 25,000 injuries, and at least \$10 billion in infrastructure and property damage. It is the deadliest terrorist attack in human history.



**Enbridge Kalamazoo River Oil Spill (Jul 28, 2010):** In July 2010, a pipeline operated by Enbridge burst and spilled into Talmadge Creek, a tributary of the Kalamazoo River. It was one of the largest inland oil spills in U.S. history. Cleanup took five years to complete.
